SSS ELECTION RESULTS

In spring 2023, the Society held elections for two roles within the organization: president for a term of three years (to end February 2026) and a seat on the Executive Council, also for a term of three years (to end February 2026).

Current president Michael Biggins stood for another term as president, and current Executive Council Member Mary-Allen Johnson also stood for another term on the Council. Both candidates were nominated during the February 10, 2023 business meeting, held over Zoom. No other candidates ran for these positions.

Biggins was re-elected president by a simple majority, and Jonhson was re-elected to the Executive Council. A short biography of each is presented below:

Michael Biggins received his PhD in Slavic languages and literatures from the U. of Kansas in 1985 and an MLS from the U. of Illinois in 1988. Since 1994 he has served as Slavic, Baltic and East European studies librarian at the U. of Washington, Seattle, where he also teaches Russian and Slovenian language, literature, and translation as an affiliate professor. He has translated into English and published some 20 book-length works of 20th-century Slovene literature and contributed articles to Slovene Studies. In 2015 he received the Janko Lavrin Diploma for lifetime contributions to Slovene literature abroad, and in 2018 was appointed Honorary Consul of the Republic of Slovenia for Washington State. At present he is researching a book-length biography of Slovene novelist Vladimir Bartol, the author of Alamut.

Mary-Allen "Pasha" Johnson,

an Associate Professor in the University Libraries of The Ohio State University, is the Curator of the Hilandar Research Library (HRL) and the Director of the Resource Center for Medieval Slavic Studies. Early in her graduate career she took a course on Reading Knowledge in Slovene and joined the Society for Slovene Studies. Returning to Ohio State with a master's in library science in 2012, Mary-Allen processed the Society's archives that were accessioned by the HRL and began attending the Society's annual meeting more regularly. With the establishment of the Slovene Research Initiative (SRI) at Ohio State in 2013, she was able to conduct research in Ljubljana on Jernej Kopitar for one month in both 2015 and 2016 (see her "'Kopitar's Collection of Slavic Codices': Its Creation and Disposition," Slovene Studies 38.1-2 [2016]: 21-39). In turn, she has assisted SRI Faculty Scholars during their research visits to Columbus and promotes Slovene studies to faculty and students at Ohio State and beyond.

TV Slovenija has premiered a documentary on Joe Valencic, a well-known figure on the Slovenian-American scene. "Joe Valencic: A Slovenian with Two Homelands" can be accessed on the TV Slovenija website at: https://www.rtvslo.si/rtv365/arhiv/174993472?s=tv

Joe was filmed in Cleveland, Chicago and Slovenia by producer Marjan Šrimpf and cinematographer Robert Kranvogel. The 50-minute documentary shows how Joe inspires Slovenian-American communities to boost interest and participation through Slovenian-themed activities. He sees the commonalities and synergies between Slovenians here and in the homeland and enables both groups to develop exchanges and celebrate their cultural identity.

Joe serves as President of the Slovenian Union of America and the Cleveland Federation of Lodges of the Slovene National Benefit Society (SNPJ). He is a founder and director of the National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame, the country's Slovenian-American music museum. Joe's weekly radio and internet broadcast features news and music from Slovenia, which he delivers in both English and Slovenian. He is a member of the Society for Slovene Studies.

The Slovenian title of the program is "Slovenec z dvema domovinama." The documentary is presented in Slovenian with several interviews in English. Personalities include Nashville's Joey Miskulin, Slovenian entertainer Vlado Kreslin, Slovenian Consul General Alenka Jerak, Dr. Luka Zibelnik from Cleveland State University, and Dr. Mirjam Milharčič Hladnik from the Institute for Slovenian Migration.

Valencic Elected President of SUA

Valencic, a member of the Society for Slovene Studies, was welcomed as National President of The Slovenian Union of America (SUA) at its recent convention in Pueblo, Colorado.

In his acceptance as President, Joe Valencic spoke of the SUA's role in connecting Slovenian-American communities across the county. "The Slovenian Union of America board members apply their strengths, skills and contacts to engage members with exciting, innovative events and projects," he said. "We help folks celebrate the Slovenian spirit in America."

The Slovenian Union of America promotes interest in and awareness of Slovenia and Slovenian culture, language and history, as well as Slovenian-American activities. SUA sponsors Slovenian-themed programming, grants and scholarships, a quarterly magazine, and a museum in Joliet, Illinois. Plans are underway for the SUA centennial

in 2026.

Past president **Mary Lou Voelk** expressed her thanks to all with whom she worked during her two terms. "You sincerely believe in the mission of our beloved Slovenian heritage," she said. "I wish you all good times and good decisions." She writes a weekly e-mail feature and articles for *Zarja – The Dawn*, the SUA's official publication.

The organization was founded in 1926 by Marie Prisland as the Slovenian Women's Union of America. Membership is open to anyone with an affinity for Slovenia and all things Slovenian. Works are judged blind by a committee that includes writers.

Slovenia guest of honor at

2023 FRANKFURT BOOK FAIR

The Frankfurt Book Fair—styled as a "Honeycomb of Words"—took place in mid-October this year with Slovenia as its guest of honor. The event marks a major milestone for Slovenian publishers, authors, and illustrators. The Frankfurt Book Fair describes the guest of honor program as a "magnet for audiences and a significant hook for the media in its coverage" of the annual event.

Calling Slovenia a "country with a rich book culture," promotional materials for the fair noted that due to "the political tunnel vision of Austria/Austro-Hungary and Yugoslavia... throughout a major part of Slovenian history the most talented and insightful Slovenian intellectuals preferred literature and culture to politics." Yet the materials also note that Slovenian literature has not historically been available widely in translation; indeed, they cite the statistic that a drastic uptick in 600 translations of Slovenian works of literature were released between 2019 and 2022, in large part in preparation for Slovenia's appearance on the Frankfurt Book Fair stage. Being featured as guest of honor at the fair goes a long way in promoting the rich literary legacy of the country. As Miha Kovač, curator for the Slovenian program, writes, it is hoped that the Guest of Honor program will "further accelerate interest in book words that are created in many smaller, but living and dynamic book cultures."

The appearance also coincides with the release of the white paper "Why higherlevel reading is important," being billed as the "Ljubljana Reading Manifesto" after its official presentation in the city on October 10, 2023. It was authored by four international scholars: Andre Schüller-Zwierlein (University of Regensburg); Anne Mangen (University of Stavanger); Miha Kovač (University of Ljubljana); and Adriaan van der Weel (Leiden University). It argues that digital environments are negatively impacting reading practices, and as a result, reading instruction should prioritize higher-level reading tasks including, but not limited to slow reading and long-form reading. - The History of Slovenian Literary Translation – featuring Erwin Köstler, Nike Kocijančič Pokorn, and Iztok Ilc.
- Foreigners in the House of Natives featuring Erica Johnson Debeljak, Carlos Pascual, and Karina Goldberg.

Slovenia to be guest of honor at

2024 BOLOGNA CHILDREN'S BOOK FAIR

The Bologna Children's Book Fair (BCBF) will take place in April 2024, and this year, Slovenia will be the guest of honor.

The fair bills itself as "the world's leading event for international rights and licensing trading" in the field of children's literature.

The Slovenian Book Agency (JAK) notes that after the Frankfurt Book Fair, held annually in October, the BCBF is "the international platform at which the greatest number of Slovene publishers from the field of children's and young adult literature are presented, either independently or as part of the Slovene national stand."

he annual fair offers several publishing awards, as well as an illustrators' exhibition, a comics corner for graphic narrative, a rights center, a translation center, and a bookseller lounge, among other arenas and events. The 2024 book fair catalog promises that the event "will offer a unique and comprehensive approach to discover the creative and rich tradition of Slovenian children's publishing."

Slovenia was originally to have been honored in 2021, according to the Slovenian Book Agency (JAK), but was postponed until 2024 after the fair did not occur in 2020 and 2021. Slovenia joins past honorees from all over the world, such as Italy (2000), Argentina (2008), Korea (2009), Croatia (2015), China (2018), to name just a short selection of past guests of honor.

In a text written in 2019 in preparation for the anticipated 2021 event, JAK reports: "The organizers of the fair have long recognized Slovenia as a country where authors' expression in the fields of illustration and literature for children exist at the highest level." Among several goals for the appearance, JAK hopes to "encourage more translations of Slovene books for children and adults into (major) foreign languages" and "present Slovene books, authors and illustrators to the wider Italian audience."

Slovenia boasts a rich tradition of children's literature which have seen some international success, chief among them *Maček Muri* (Muri the Cat), written by Kajetan Kovič and illustrated by Jelka Reichman in 1975. Last year, illustrators Ana Zavadlav and Huiqin Wang, as well as writers Miroslav Košuta and Andrej Rozman Roza, were nominated for prizes at the BCBF. This year's nominees have yet to be announced.

2024 will represent the sixty-first year the fair has been held, and it will take place from April 8-11 in the city of Bologna. Those interested in reading more about the fair and its history, as well as Slovenia's role in this year's events, are welcome to consult:

Annual Midwest Slavic Conference

he annual Midwest Slavic
Conference will be held on
April 5-7, 2024 at The Ohio
State University in Columbus,
Ohio, hosted by the University's
Center for Slavic, East European and
Eurasian Studies. This year's theme
is "Cold Wars Past and Present,"
though proposals may be submitted
on any topic related to the Slavic
region. Dr .Richard Hermann of OSU
will deliver the keynote address.

The CFP elaborates on the theme: "The impact of Cold War-era tensions can still be felt in many parts of Eastern Europe and Eurasia and the effects continue to shape political and social landscapes. We welcome papers that will examine the ways in which the Cold War has influenced political ideologies, relationships with the West, and ongoing conflicts and pressures in the region. The conference theme will provide students and scholars with the opportunity to discuss these complex political and social dynamics."

To submit to the conference, presenters are asked to draft a one-paragraph abstract and to combine that with a C.V. in a PDF file. The conference welcomes submissions for individual or pre-formed panels.

Submissions are due by 11:59 pm EST on January 26, 2024 to an online submission portal (linked here: https://slaviccenter.osu.edu/about/conferences/midwest-slavic), and acceptances will be announced on February 19. For those looking to attend but not present, a schedule of panels will be announced on February 23.

Registration fees range from \$25 for general attendees to \$50 for faculty; more details can be found on the conference website (linked above). Of note: students are able to request a waiver code by contacting cseees@osu.edu. Faculty and others who wish to sponsor a young scholar may email the same address to coordinate donating a conference registration fee.
